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#### **Executive Summary**

Mitigation is the effort to reduce loss of life and property by lessening the impact of disasters. Hazard mitigation focuses attention and resources on county and municipal policies and actions that will produce successive benefits over time. State and local governments engage in hazard mitigation planning to identify risks and vulnerabilities associated with natural as well as human-caused hazards and develop long-term strategies for protecting people and property from future hazard events. Mitigation plans are key to breaking the cycle of disaster damage, reconstruction, and repeated damage. This plan represents the work of citizens, elected and appointed government officials, business leaders, and volunteer and nonprofit groups to protect community assets, preserve the economic viability of the community, and save lives.

In 2024, the Mifflin County Office of Public Safety contracted the services of a consulting agency to revise and update the Mifflin County Hazard Mitigation Plan. The plan was successfully updated in accordance with the requirements set forth by PEMA and FEMA. The updated Mifflin County Hazard Mitigation Plan was adopted by the Mifflin County Commissioners in 2020. All sixteen municipalities adopted the 2019 Mifflin County Hazard Mitigation Plan as the municipal hazard mitigation plan, and it is anticipated that all participating municipalities will adopt the 2025 Mifflin County Hazard Mitigation Plan Update.

The Mifflin County Commissioners secured a grant to complete the 2025 update to the Mifflin County Hazard Mitigation Plan. MCM Consulting Group, Inc. was hired to assist the county with the update of the plan. The planning kick-off meeting was conducted on January 24, 2024.

The planning process for the 2025 Mifflin County Hazard Mitigation Plan Update consisted of the following:

- Identification and prioritization of the hazards that may affect the county and its municipalities.
- Assessment of the county's and municipalities' vulnerability to these hazards.
- Identification of the mitigation actions and projects that can reduce that vulnerability.
- Development of a strategy for implementing the actions and projects, including identifying the agency(ies) responsible for that implementation.

Throughout the planning process, the general public was given the opportunity to comment on the existing HMP and provide suggestions for the updated version. Due to COVID-19, public meetings were conducted via an online survey to provide residents an opportunity to provide

input on the HMP. Several meetings were held in person with a virtual option, and participants were invited to submit surveys and other documents via an online survey.

The following hazards were identified by the local planning team as presenting the highest risk to the county and its municipalities:

A total of twenty-six hazards have been identified in the 2025 Mifflin County Hazard Mitigation Plan. A total of twenty-one identified hazards were listed in the previous 2019 plan update. The new hazards include blighted properties, disorientation, nuclear incidents, substance use disorder, and terrorism/cyberterrorism.


To mitigate against the effects of these hazards, the local planning team identified the following goals for hazard mitigation over the next five years:

- Reduce potential injury/death and damage to existing community assets due to floods, flash floods, and ice jams.
- Reduce potential injury/death and damage to community assets due to all hazards.
- Promote disaster-resistant future development.
- Promote hazard mitigation as a public value in recognition of its importance to the health, safety, and welfare of the population.
- Improve response and recovery capabilities.
- Protect critical infrastructure.

Mitigation actions are specific projects and activities that help achieve goals. A total of sixty-nine actions were developed for this plan update as they pertain to hazards identified by the local planning team. The 2019 Mifflin County Hazard Mitigation Plan consisted of fifty-five total actions. The individual objectives and actions that will be implemented are shown in Section 6.4. Each municipality was provided the opportunity to submit new project opportunity forms for this update. A total of eighteen project opportunities were submitted for this plan update.

The 2025 Mifflin County Hazard Mitigation Plan is the cornerstone to reducing Mifflin County's vulnerability to disasters. It is the commitment to reducing risks from hazards and serves as a guide for decision makers as they commit resources to reducing the effects of hazards. Hazard mitigation is the only phase of emergency management specifically dedicated to breaking the cycle of damage, reconstruction, and repeated damage.

The 2025 Mifflin County Hazard Mitigation Plan is a living document that reflects ongoing hazard mitigation activities and requires monitoring, evaluating, and updating to ensure the mitigation actions are implemented. To facilitate the hazard mitigation planning process and adhere to regulatory requirements, the plan will be reviewed annually, and any major revisions will be incorporated into the five-year update.

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#### **Executive Summary**

The Mifflin County Pre-Disaster Recovery Plan was developed in cooperation with the agencies, stakeholders, state, and federal partners listed in Appendix A: The Mifflin County Recovery Planning Team.

The type of recovery effort is determined by the nature and magnitude of the event. Recovery assistance may be delivered via the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA), U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), the Individual Assistance Program of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), the Public Assistance Program of FEMA, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, or through normal emergency management program areas, e.g., the *South Central Mountains Regional Task Force* and mutual aid.

Hazard mitigation assistance is normally provided following a federally declared disaster and will be delivered either by the Section 406 Public Assistance Program or by Section 404 Hazard Mitigation Program through FEMA and the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency (PEMA). The 404 funding is used to provide protection to undamaged parts of a public facility or to prevent or reduce damage caused by future disasters. Section 406 is applied on the parts of the public facility that were damaged by the disaster and the mitigation measure directly reduces the potential of future, similar disaster damages to the eligible facility. The county supports education on these measures to support this plan and the 2025 Mifflin County Hazard Mitigation Plan. Both programs must directly reduce the potential of future damage to the damaged portions of the facility, be cost-effective, be technically feasible, and promise to be efficacious.

This plan was developed in accordance with the FEMA "National Disaster Recovery Framework, Second Edition (2016)" and the "Pre-Disaster Recovery Planning Guide for Local Governments, First Edition (2017)" to support federal recovery efforts, guidance, regulations, and requirements. The guiding principles and core capabilities highlighted within these two federal documents have been incorporated within this plan to enable preparedness and recovery.

The primary audience for this plan includes county leadership, county departments, communities within the county, and other applicable stakeholders that will be involved in the recovery process preceding a disaster. This plan clearly identifies, to all stakeholders, the county's pre-disaster recovery goals, county priorities and policies, and the roles and responsibilities of various stakeholders in supporting the recovery process. This enables external partners to easily integrate into the recovery process.

Pre-disaster planning for recovery in the county is an ongoing process under the leadership of the Mifflin County Office of Public Safety. The plan sets forth, in the coordination and execution of recovery plans, policies and procedures that guide recovery from major events.

- Section 1: Purpose and Scope Describes the purpose the plan serves and its overall breadth of relevance to the community.
- Section 2: Situation and Assumptions Outlines capacities and mitigation measures that exist within the county and Pennsylvania.
- Section 3: Concept of Operations Outlines how to execute the recovery process.
- Section 4: Recovery Responsibilities and Priorities Describes primary and support agencies and their roles and responsibilities in short-, intermediate- and long-term recovery priorities.
- Section 5: Administration and Logistics Outlines the plan evaluation and maintenance process, and sector-specific elements of the plan (Recovery Support Functions [RSF] Checklists).
- Appendices contain useful reference and operations materials, including potential sources of pre-disaster recovery and post-disaster recovery funding.
